On February 23, we held a K-6 Townhall at the GGEA office. Close to 50 teachers were in attendance along with District personnel Lisa Chavez Swartz (Assistant Superintendent, Elementary Education), Valerie Shedd (Assistant Superintendent, SpEd), Jason Bevacqua (Assistant Superintendent, Personnel), Monica Ibarra-Acosta (Director K6 Instruction), and Erin Lara (Director of SpEd). The town hall was organized to provide feedback to the district



about some of the district programs and protocols; namely, Fastbridge, how Inclusion is affecting our M/M and Gen Ed students, and discipline.

Stacey Carter, Tamra Wood, Kristy Gladysz, Kathleen Barbeito and Jennifer Scrofini provided insight about their classroom experience with these issues. Together, we offered the district suggestions we feel would help improve our students' learning environments. The District asked questions and wrote notes. They committed to bringing what they heard to Dr. Mafi to help figure out solutions. So, we're hopeful that additional support can be provided.



The townhall was organized by our Elementary Segment Directors, Julie Vo, Karyn Lui-Silverberg, Dawn Floyd, and Sarah Held (who hosted the meeting). They worked long hours after school to help organize the meeting.

The greatest benefit will be the savings of almost \$20,000 per year in the cost of rent. The new location also has a better parking lot, "no more off-roading." And the door can remain unlocked for our members to visit.

At our previous location we had a lot of unused space that was creating an unnecessary expense. Originally that space was used for Segment and Rep Council meetings. Going forward segment meetings will be on Zoom and Rep Council meetings will be at a GGUSD school site.

GGEA's new address is 12912 Brookhurst St., Suite 360, Garden Grove, CA. 92840. We are located on the 3rd floor of the tall black glass building near the northeast corner of Brookhurst Street and Garden Grove Boulevard. This location is also about a ½ mile closer to the district office.

FAITH'S HOPE

Our own Cork Snider (La Qunita H.S.) was inspired by a former student to start a scholarship fund called "Faith's Hope" through Tour de Recovery. According to Cork, "my scholarship was inspired by a former student and has given away three cars and tuition scholarships to women who leave recovery centers."

Tour de Recovery is a unique bike riding event that celebrates and brings awareness to recovery from behavioral health challenges. Funds raised benefit TURN Behavioral Health Services. This endurance event spans 7 days over 500 miles through California with media tour stops at TURN programs in Fresno, Bakersfield, San Bernardino, Orange, and San Diego. The ride ends with an inspiring finish celebration at TURN Family Recovery Center in Oceanside.

On January 26, 2023, the first three "Faith's Hope" scholarship winners were awarded. Two received large down-payments for a car to solve their transportation needs and a third got school supplies, including a computer, so she can reach her goals through education. It was also announced that this year's tour has a goal of \$150,000 as it aims in year two to help many more people. The event was an hour long, with lots of tears shed, featuring talks from all the recipients, Snider, and CEO Jim Callaghan.



WHAT IS THE IMAD AWARD??





PRESCHOOL NURSES ROCK!

Our State Preschool Program has two wonderful Pediatric Nurses Stephanie Kovats and Susan Lin that we would like to highlight for going above and beyond in their duties as program nurses. Their duties cover 12 school sites with multiple classes to serve our State Preschool children and staff. Susan and Stephanie are responsible for vision, hearing, and dental screenings annually. They screen ASQ surveys for health concerns and allergies as well as intake of medicine required to be on site for some of our children. They do health checks on our students for various issues and can always be reached by phone if offsite. Phone calls to parents, doctors, visits to classrooms, staff training and parenting classes are just some of their responsibilities; Susan and Stephanie also schedule and coordinate the CCFC Annual Community Health and Resource Fair.

Last year the nurses decided to take on an extra duty to help the staff with their Desired Results Developmental Profile DRDP assessments that are required to be done twice a year on each child in our program. The section on Physical Development- Health Measures requires observations that include evidence of activities such as running, catching, climbing, and jumping. Our nurses planned a routine that could be completed during our 30-minute Outdoor Learning Time which has been an incredible asset to the teachers and the program. Thanks so much for all you do Stephanie and Susan, you make a difference.


